Vandenberg's Aerospace Show 2000 brings the high-flying Air Force Thunderbirds for a two-day show, Oct. 14 and 15. Gates open at 8:30 a.m. and close at 5 p.m. Parking and admission are free. In addition to the Thunderbirds' aerial acrobatics, there will be a number of military and civilian aircraft in the air and on the ground, and space and missile displays on the flightline. A few of the military aircraft on display will be an A-10 Thunderbolt, C-5 Galaxy, and T-38 Talon. The F-117 Nighthawk stealth fighter and B-2 Spirit stealth bomber will conduct fly-bys. # Logistics is integrated in everything we do

**L**ogistics: it's integral to everything we do. It is defined as the procurement, maintenance, distribution and replacement of people and materiel.

Clearly, logistics is a large part of any military endeavor and often takes up most of the time in a campaign.

Recent, and very good, examples of logistical operations are Desert Shield and Desert Storm. The successful, U.S. led Coalition effort to expel Iraqi forces from Kuwait consisted of five and a half months of logistics, 40 days of air campaign, and a mere 100-hour land battle. The vast amount of people and materiel the logisticians moved to the combat zone ensured that the war was won before the first shot was fired.

So what does logistics have to do with Vandenberg? In a word, everything. In fact, every-

one is in some way a logistician. We all spend part of our duty day buying, fixing, moving and replacing things. Every unit on base uses an international merchants purchase authorization card to purchase supplies and equipment.

Units have a vehicle control officer to manage the cars and trucks, and all of us keep our office or mission equipment in working order. We do it without thinking about logistics because these activities are integral to our operations.

Even though we all work logistics, some of us specialize in it. I'm proud to be the head of the 30th Logistics Group. We have communications, contracting, and transportation squadrons, a supply flight, and a large, group-level staff function called the performance management division.

The 30th Communications Squadron has broken new ground by moving to the logistics group from their traditional affiliation with the support group.

Our 30th Contracting Squadron continues its

excellent tradition of procuring the manpower, supplies and services that support all the wing's missions.

The 30th Transportation Squadron is the moving force for all we do on base, from getting our household goods delivered to keeping our vehicle fleet operating and arranging air transport.

The supply flight is a small but effective unit which teams with the world's best supply contractors. In the coming months you'll see this outfit provide more of the exotic fuels for our space boosters.

The group-level performance management division acts as program manager for the base's major contracts and provides quality assurance oversight.

The 30th Logistics Group carries on a proud tradition of supply, transportation, maintenance, and contracting. In the coming months we'll continue to work with operations, support and medical groups and associate units to ensure all of Team Vandenberg's missions continue their 100 percent success. # Families urged to develop, practice home fire escape plan

For the third consecutive year, the Vandenberg Fire Department has teamed up with the National Fire Protection Association, the official sponsor of Fire Prevention Week for nearly 80 years, and other fire departments across North America to execute "The Great Escape" during fire prevention week.

Launched by the NFPA, "The Great Escape" is a three-year public safety campaign designed to get more people to develop and practice a home fire escape plan than ever before.

Results show that the campaign is already working. The NFPA documented nearly 500,000 families' participation in the great escape last year with 100 lives saved as a direct result.

Unfortunately we still have a long way to go. Because most people underestimate fire's power and speed they don't consider an escape plan as a major safety issue in their lives.

Under ideal conditions, a person has one or two minutes to safely escape a typical house fire safely. Home fire escape planning and practice are critical because they ensure that everyone knows how to use those minutes wisely to escape unharmed.

Here are some suggestions to help your family

prepare for the great escape.

Go home tonight and sit down with your family and create a home escape plan. It would be a tragedy if something happened to your family because you procrastinated and did nothing to prepare them.

Draw a diagram of your home. Plan two ways out of every room, especially bedrooms.

Be sure you can unlock all locks and open all windows even in the dark.

In case of fire, don't stop for anything. Do not try to take possessions or pets. Just get out. Call the fire department from a

neighbor's phone.

Everyone should gather at one meeting place outside, preferably at the front, where the fire department should arrive.

Each family member should know how to call the fire department from a neighbor's home.

Make sure everyone in your family knows that once they are out, no one can go back in for any reason. If people are trapped, firefighters have the best chance of rescuing them.

Clearly, "The Great escape" has had a life saving impact on the public. It's wonderful to see the positive effects of this campaign on the families of Vandenberg, especially in light of the devastating Harris and Peacekeeper fires suffered last month.

As we worked to put the fire out, it was comforting to know that the families of Team Vandenberg and base leadership were prepared because of this fire prevention campaign known as "The Great Escape."



**Oct. 12** A fire truck parade will start at 5 p.m. from Wyoming Avenue near the gym annex.


Parade vehicles need to assemble in the parking lot across the street from the gym annex on Wyoming Avenue at 4:30 p.m. Oct. 12.

different issues to his attention.

Parish said NCOs are usually concerned with retaining trained and qualified people, and the direction in which the Air Force is headed.

In contrast, he finds airmen are more concerned with quality of life issues.

But many of the questions the chief hears from NCOs and airmen alike are concerned with medical care and education benefits, especially, the \$3,500 annual limit now on tuition assistance.

Those are important issues, Parish said, but they're not issues that force people out of the Air Force.

"I'm not convinced yet that our people leave the Air Force because of money," he added. "I think there's more to it than that. I try to tell our NCOs to create an environment that causes you to want to be a part of our Air Force." That can go a long way in helping take care of the retention problem, he said. "Most of us stayed in the Air Force because we liked what we were doing and we liked the people we worked with."

Parish observed on his visit to the FTAC that the airman like the four-week initiation to the base. It gives them an opportunity to meet people from other organizations with similar skills, grade and time in

service, he said.

The 32 year Air Force veteran that in the past, the only way such interaction occurred was through chance social meetings or in their day-to-day duties. It's a good thing that they get a chance to meet peers with similar likes and issues from different Air Force specialties, he said. They gain a wider perspective on the Air Force from this interaction.

When Parish was chief master sergeant of the Air Force, retention was not a major problem. The Air Force, and the military as a whole, was experiencing a build up and there was a positive can-do attitude, he said.

However, it is a very different world and Air Force today. There are many vacancies in the NCO ranks now, which can account for the record number of promotions, he said.

In conclusion, Parish said that the best way for airmen to develop professionally, is to be the best that they can be at what they do no matter what.

"People shouldn't worry about whether or not their supervisor likes them or they like their supervisor," he said.

"If a person is good at what he does, his professionalism will shine through. People will see the good that he is doing. I believe if you can do that, then the Air Force will reward you and take care of you."






